The Maintenance department will have trucks available for yard cleanup for brush/woody material only (no plant materials or grass clippings). Give us a call at 527-6508 to schedule a truck. You fill it and we will haul it away.

Now that Spring is upon us, we see that Old Man Winter was not bitter this year, but it brings us to this: The battle for your blood will be high. Things to look out for this Spring to avoid those biting insects —

- 1) Standing Water it does not take much to get mosquito a population going. Check gutters, kid's outdoor toys, tarps covering up campers and items left outside that can collect water. The chances of a widespread outbreak of the Zika virus are small. However, we should still employ common-sense strategies during mosquito season to avoid being bitten (use insect repellant, wear protective clothing, eliminate potential mosquito breeding grounds). There are mosquitoborne diseases that are already established in Ohio, such as West Nile virus and the La Crosse virus.
- 2) Not to be outdone by the mosquito, the tick is showing great force this year just like Bengal's linebacker Vontaze Burfict hitting a Pittsburgh Steelers player before you know it you're asking yourself, what hit me? Chances are it will be Lyme disease or Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. Blacklegged, Lone star and American dog tick numbers will be high this year because of the mild winters, so stay to the center of the trails and wear protective clothing as much as possible.

How to remove a tick: use tweezers, tick tool or protected finger/ thumb and pull strait back. If you save the tick to be tested, put it in a vial of alcohol. Do not remove the tick using these methods: heat (matches, lighters, candles), suffocation (Vaseline, fingernail polish), and don't twist it.

One more thing to note: If you are heading to eastern parts of Ohio this year, there will be a Cicada outbreak this Spring.

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#### TAX TIPS AND TOPICS

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

**IMPORTANT, THIS YEAR** in an effort to return checks to taxpayers more timely, the Tax Department is again depositing checks prior to reviewing returns.

Under this procedure, you could receive a correction letter requesting additional information or stating tax due as late as June 30, 2016.

**Estimated Tax Changes:** 1) Estimated tax for 2016 must be paid if you anticipate tax due for 2016 of \$200.00 or more.

- 2) Estimated 2016 quarterly due dates are earlier. 1<sup>st</sup> quarter was due 4-18-16 with your Tax Return; 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter is due 6-15-16; 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter is due 9-15-16; 4<sup>th</sup> quarter is due 12-15-16.
- 3) You must pay 90% of your 2016 Estimated Tax "by 1-31-17 to avoid penalty and interest". You may pay 2016 estimated tax quarterly or in a lump sum in January of 2017. The 2016 tax estimated to be due is on the bottom of your 2015 tax Return or contact our office for help.

Who must file a tax return with the Village of Fairfax? All residents 18 years of age or older. This includes those who rent. The 2015 Tax Return was due 4-18-15, late fees now apply.

Tax Returns are on our website <a href="www.fairfaxoh.org">www.fairfaxoh.org</a> and available in Municipal Building lobby. Not receiving a form does not excuse anyone from filing a Tax Return.

**Taxes are based on an individual's earned income.** See reverse of tax form and website for instructions, <a href="www.fairfaxoh.org">www.fairfaxoh.org</a>.

If you file a Federal extension, you must also file an extension with the Village of Fairfax. "Extensions are only for filing your return", any tax estimated to be due for 2015 must be paid with your 2015 extension to avoid penalty and/or interest charges.

Any questions about your 2015 Fairfax Tax or 2016 estimated tax call the Tax Office 527-6506.

"New residents" and those "who moved" since filing their last tax return must register. Please call the Tax Office at 527-6506 promptly. If you leave a message, spell your name and include your SS#, address, phone number and date you moved in.

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#### Student Drug Use Survey Delivers Critical Information for Our Neighborhood

Is teen alcohol or marijuana use on the rise in our community? Which factors contribute to - or discourage- youth substance abuse? These questions and many more were answered on April 5 when the Warrior Coalition hosted an important meeting to discuss the results from the 2015 Mariemont School District Student Drug Use Survey. Survey results were presented by Amanda Conn Starner of PreventionFIRST!, formerly the Coalition for a Drug-Free Greater Cincinnati. PreventionFIRST! was founded in 1996 as a comprehensive effort to reduce adolescent alcohol and drug use.

The mission of PreventionFIRST! is to increase public awareness of illegal substance abuse and to empower families and youth with knowledge to practice prevention. As part of this, they conduct a Student Drug Use Survey every two years across a 10-county region in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky. There were a total of 39,085 7<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade students from 88 schools, public and private, who completed the survey. Mariemont Junior High and High School students participated in the Survey between September and November 2015.

The Survey delivered some very positive results. It found that most kids in our district are NOT using alcohol, tobacco or other drugs. In fact, use continues to decline; fewer Mariemont students are regular users than in 2000. In addition, age of first use has risen since that time. The table below shows the 2015 Survey Results for the five key measures of substance abuse in Mariemont City Schools. The positive results are an indication that the collaboration between the community and organizations like the Warrior Coalition and PreventionFIRST! are working.

Again, overall the results indicate that most kids in the Mariemont School District are NOT using alcohol, tobacco or other drugs. Alcohol use among 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders in our Junior High stands at 2.1%-the lowest in the region- compared to 6.5% among other tristate participants in that age group. Unfortunately, that district number increases to 25.3% in high school- surpassing reported usage in other participating high schools-which stands at 21.2%.

In general, the Perceived Harm is high across the board for alcohol, cigarettes/tobacco, marijuana, and prescription drugs. Marijuana is perceived as the least harmful. This could be due, in part, to efforts to legalize the drug in certain states. This trend is concerning because the Perception of Harm measure is a primary predictor of substance abuse. Between 7<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade, the measure of marijuana's Perceived Harm steadily decreases while Past 30-Day Use steadily increases.

The 2015 Survey also indicates record high levels of Parental Disapproval and Friend Disapproval. Perception of Parental Disapproval is higher for Cigarettes/Tobacco, Prescription Drugs and Marijuana than for Alcohol. Parents are the primary influence in a young person's life. Therefore, disappointing a parent is a strong factor in not wanting to use or abuse drugs.

When do kids first start? Age of first use has continued to rise since 2006 and is now between 14 and 15 years old. Age of First Use is very important because the brain continues to develop until the mid-twenties. Data confirms that, during development, the effects of alcohol and drug use are particularly harmful. Additionally, addiction is a developmental disease starting in adolescence. Research shows that users who start before age 15 are five times more likely to develop a substance abuse problem in adulthood.

While the results are mostly positive, we must continue to be vigilant, promote positive social behaviors and encourage health and wellness. Parents and teachers must talk about the dangers of using alcohol and drugs, parents and schools must establish clear rules about using these substances, and we must encourage participation in school and community activities that promote health and well-being. We know that 13 is a pivotal age and that when we focus on protective factors, we can continue to keep our teens healthy and thriving.

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#### RESIDENTIAL STREET PROJECTS - 2016

The Village currently has out to bid a project for curb and street replacement for Bancroft, lower Germania and Warren. The Cincinnati Water Works is replacing the water mains on both Bancroft and Warren, so we will replace the street and curbs at the same time. A contract is expected to be awarded in May 2016, and the project will begin sometime after that. Once a contractor is determined, residents living on these streets will be notified before work begins with more details on the project.

Once the bids are determined and a contract is awarded, the Village will see how much funds are left in the streets budget to see if any other Village streets will be done this year.

#### REMINDER—GAS METER INSPECTIONS

Beginning in February and through May of this year, Duke Energy will be performing inspections on gas metering equipment and piping located inside buildings in this area. The inspections will involve the gas piping from the building wall to the outlet of the gas meter to check for leakage and corrosion. On average, an inspection should take approximately ten minutes to complete.

Duke Energy has contacted with Southern Cross, Inc. to complete these inspections at residents and businesses with inside gas meters. The Southern Cross technician will be readily identifiable by wearing a visible Southern Cross ID picture ID as well as having a contact number for the customer to call for verification of the Duke Energy Ohio inspection. They will be driving a Southern Cross vehicle.
